OUR VISION

We envision a community in which everyone has access to sufficient, locally sourced and nutritious food. To help achieve this we provide volunteer opportunities for neighbors to help neighbors.

OUR MISSION

The mission of Warner Connects NH is to improve the health and well-being of area residents in need by providing access to healthy foods, nutrition education, and clothing.

OUR VALUES

We believe that access to nutritious food is a basic human right. We are committed to responding to the needs of our community through food acquisition, processing, and storage to expand our distribution network and provide necessary supportive services.

Therefore:

We value respect, compassion and honesty in all interactions and activities.

We value active listening and learning, appreciating the worth and diversity of each person.

We value the wise use of resources, creating new ways to improve our services and develop effective partnerships among the community-based organizations, agencies and churches that help sustain our work.

We value our volunteers and their diverse talents, background, passions and commitment to helping families and individuals.

We value the right of everyone, of all ages, to choose a diet that is nutritious, varied, and culturally appropriate from sources that are consistent, reliable, and preferably local.

We understand that food insecurity often exceeds the receipt of emergency food and we are committed to connect participants with area service providers who can help, as well as community and state resources that are available.

OUR HISTORY

Warner Connects NH began December 15, 2020, with their first official board meeting in February 2021. In addition, in 2021 the Family Closet was added as part of the business model to provide the income stream for the food pantry. Our organization has two very distinctive arms of operation: our food pantry (Warner Area Food Pantry) which services clients with food, and the Family Closet which accepts donations to create revenue for the pantry.

We have been located in the Town of Warner's Community Center since we opened operations. Our current space in the Warner Community Center houses the food pantry on the 1st level (1200sf) and the Family Closet on the 2nd level (860sf). The Selectboard approved the use of space for both areas of our organization in 2021. At Town Meeting 2024 it was voted and passed to allow us to occupy our spaces rent free as of July 2024 as long as we continue to

provide service to the community. Prior to November 2023 we did not pay rent as we have been providing the town with a valuable service to the community at no charge.

The Warner Area Food Pantry is considered an area food pantry to Community Action Program (CAP) and the USDA. We combine USDA nonperishables with fresh fruits and vegetables, meats, eggs, dairy, bread, cooking essentials, toiletries and more. The food pantry receives food and monetary donations from local residents, businesses, churches, farms, civic organizations, and several area agencies. In March 2024 we started a new partnership with NH Food Bank, which has added a variety of commodities for our clients to choose from. Our clients have varying needs for support, and they all receive personal attention and contact, which many need for social connection. Deliveries are made to those who are elderly, disabled, or unable to get to the pantry on their own or with help. Our volunteers who pack up, deliver, sort, load, stock shelves, clean, pick up, and do paperwork are encouraged to connect with clients, and for many of our clients on service days, and for many of our clients these connections are an important part of their week.

The Family Closet thrift store is an income stream for the food pantry, as we are one organization. This income helps pay for food purchased to supplement USDA food (as listed above). It also supports operational costs, supplies, overhead, and gas cards for volunteers who do delivery/pickup. The Family Closet serves customers and clients with affordable clothing, shoes and bedding, averaging 164 customers a month. The Family Closet also provides clothes and accessories to clients through store gift certificates. This includes families identified by the schools and families with recent loss or sudden displacement (i.e. due to natural disaster, domestic violence or psychiatric release), often referred by one of our many community partners, such as The Crisis Center, New London Hospital Psychiatric Unit, and the Foster Babies Program. Family Closet is a sustainable location for residents to donate usable clothing, and it brings people to town who are likely to support other local businesses.

OUR CLIENTS – 2024 Year End Totals

Our clients are qualified through USDA guidelines as they already receive social services for income-based need and/or assistance programs (i.e.: fuel assistance, food stamps, WIC, etc.), either through the state or federal agencies. We are able to service clients once a week. **These statistics reflect the entire year; many households visit once a week.**


Donated food comes from the multiple partners and community members. \$15,226

We purchase food from Market Basket weekly, and other local vendors as needed to fill needed commodities. \$7,000

Grants vary from year to year. We currently have 1 grant, in a 2-year cycle. First distribution 2024.



These totals are both donated and purchased food costs. The need for assistance has risen along with the cost of food. We have projected a 40% increase for 2025.
